# Community-Based Intervention Center (CBIC)

#### **PARTICIPANT REQUIREMENTS**

Youth must meet the following criteria to be accepted into the program:

- Assigned a Home Detention or Probation Officer
- Moderate to High Risk on the Dispositional OYAS
- Age 14 or older
- Male only

## **EXCLUSIONARY CRITERIA**

- Youth can NOT be Low Risk on the OYAS.
- Youth will <u>NOT</u> be accepted if they present with only with sexual offending behaviors, developmental disabilities, TBI, IQ below 71, autism spectrum disorder, active psychosis, or suicidal or homicidal gestures.
- Program can <u>NOT</u> run concurrent with other programs, such as MST or IOP.
- Youth will <u>NOT</u> be accepted if they are enrolled in the Safe Harbor Docket.
- Youth will NOT be accepted if they do not have a stable residence.

## TWO PROGRAM TRACKS

Targeted Program Length 10 to 12 weeks based on needs and progress.

## FULL-DAY

- Picked up and dropped off at home
- Schedule:
  - Mon. to Fri. 7am pick-up to 6:30 pm drop-off
- School of One (CMSD) on site education
- Participate in groups
- Access to case manager- Applewood

## HALF-DAY

- Picked up from school and dropped off at home or school.
- Schedule:
  - Mon. to Fri. After school pick-up to
    6:30 pm drop-off
- Participate in groups
- Access to case manager- Applewood

## **PROGRAM CURRICULUM FOR BOTH TRACKS**

Cognitive-Behavioral Interventions for Offenders- Comprehensive Curriculum (CBI-CC) Groups will allow for skills role-play and feedback, modeling prosocial behavior and thinking, participating in group interventions and completion of homework to address risky thinking.

The CBI-CC Modules are as follows:

- Motivational Engagement
- Intro to Cognitive Behavioral Interventions
- Cognitive Restructuring
- Emotional Regulation

- Understanding Behavior Patterns
- Choosing Behavior Responses
- Problem Solving
- Panning your Future

- Success Planning
- Gangs\*
- Peers\*
- Violence\*

Youth will obtain skills to resolve conflict, engage in problems solving, develop long-term goals for themselves, examine risky peer relationships, learn to interact better with authority figures, develop a network of positive social supports, and engage in success planning before they are successfully terminated from CBIC.
